RANDOLPH COUNTY MILL VILLAGES: Coleridge

Coleridge was the home of the Enterprise Manufacturing Company, the southern most cotton mill built on Deep River. Its construction in 1882 was the final link in the chain of Randolph County's waterpowered textile industries which had begun to be forged in 1836. The company was organized by H.A. Moffitt, an Asheboro merchant, and Daniel Lambert and James A. Cole, prominent citizens of southeastern Randolph. The original structure was a two-and-one-half story wooden building housing 800 spindles and 26 workers. The facilities of the corporation included a wool-carding mill, saw mill, and flour mill.

The surrounding village was known first as Cole's Ridge and then as Coleridge, after James A. Cole, who in 1904 sold a majority interest in the company to his son-in-law, Dr. Robert L. Caveness. By 1917 it was said that "R. L. Caveness is at the head of practically

everything in Coleridge," and it was under his influence that the brick mill facilities were built. The factory (built in the 1920's) is of utilitarian design with Tudor Revival entrance towers. The company store, bending mill, and warehouse (all built circa 1910), and the company office and Bank of Coleridge (built in the 1920's)

were all constructed in the Romanesque Revival style. Caveness also directed the town's only other industry, the Coleridge Manufacturing Company, which made parts of bentwood chairs.

The Concord Methodist Church was built in Coleridge in 1887. Just behind the church building was located the Coleridge Academy,

which included a room for the Masonic Lodge. The academy was formed in 1890 from two smaller schools, and closed in 1936. The Bank of Coleridge was founded in 1919, opened a branch in Ramseur in 1934, and moved there in 1939. The Enterprise Roller Mill, grinding wheat with steel rollers instead of stones, was the first roller mill in Randolph County. Its "Our Leader" flour was



very popular in the area. Dr. Caveness remained personally involved in the operation of the mill, although he tried to return to his medical practice in 1922.

In 1959 the mill boasted 6,000 spindles and 150 employees, manufacturing cotton or knitting yarn and twine. In 1951, Dr. Caveness died and the business immediately began to decline. His heirs sold out to Boaz Mills of Alabama in 1954, and in 1958 the mill was closed and the equipment sold off. The buildings have since been used as warehouse space.

The village was Randolph County's first historic district, and has been placed on the National Register or Historic Places. Its 1970 nomination stated that "the chief appeal of this site is as a picturesque example of a riverside mill seen in one of North Carolina's oldest manufacturing sections."

Soy-Ginger Pot Roast

Ingredients:

1 boneless beef chuck roast (3 to 4 pounds)

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 tablespoon canola oil

1-1/2 cups water

1/2 cup reduced-sodium soy sauce

1/4 cup honey

3 tablespoons cider vinegar

3 garlic cloves, minced

2 teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon ground mustard

1 large onion, halved and sliced

2 tablespoons cornstarch

2 tablespoons cold water

Sprinkle roast with salt and pepper. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Brown roast on all sides. Transfer meat to a 5- or 6-qt. slow cooker. In a small bowl, mix water, soy sauce, honey, vinegar, garlic, ginger and mustard; pour over meat. Top with onion. Cook, covered, on low 7-9 hours, until meat is tender.

Remove roast and onion to a serving platter; keep warm. Transfer cooking juices to a large saucepan; skim fat. Bring cooking juices to a boil. In a small bowl, mix cornstarch and cold water until smooth; stir into cooking juices. Return to a boil; cook and stir until thickened, 1-2 minutes. Serve with roast.

Wolfspeed has made a key land acquisition as it looks to build its massive factory in western Chatham County.

Wolfspeed (NYSE:WOLF), based in Durham, purchased 445 acres in Chatham County for more than \$15.2 million, according to a deed filed March 3. The purchase prices comes out to about \$34,200 an acre.


The Chatham-Siler City Advanced Manufacturing Megasite where Wolfspeed is building its plant sits along U.S. Highway 64 on the western edge of the county near its border with Randolph County.

This land purchase represents a major step for Wolfspeed, which is working on a project set to reshape the western portion of Chatham County. The \$5 billion facility will produce next-generation materials and is expected to employ 1,800 people at full buildout. The project is the largest capital investment in North Carolina economic development history.

A Wolfspeed spokesperson did not return a request for comment about the land purchase.









Watch Out for These (Arthropod) Spring Home Invaders

Insects and other arthropods are feeling the warm weather and waking up for spring. Bees, social wasps, bugs, flies, ants, and other critters are getting busy with their 2021 plans. That means lots of the activity outdoors that sometimes continues indoors.

The NC State University Plant Disease and Insect Clinic has received a few samples of two of these invaders, species that may not be familiar to folks. Luckily neither are dangerous nor long-term visitors.



An adult clover mite (Bryobia sp.). These small mites are somewhat flattened with long front legs and a mottled green/ orange body covered in scales.

The first is a type of mite I wrote about a while ago during one such year: clover mites (Tetranychidae: Bryobia sp.; above). These small arachnids are cousins of the more familiar spider mites and also feed on plants. They are most active in spring and fall, sometimes in mass numbers around yards where they crawl inadvertently into homes. When people see them they may get frightened and squish them, producing a blood spot. Fear not, though: this is the poor mite's blood as they do not bite humans or other animals.


Clover mite infestations typically only last a short time (few weeks) and the mites can be simply vacuumed up. They require some humidity, so they are often found dead in homes or perish quickly, due to being dryer than the outdoors.

The second invader is a type of scarab beetle, called the dark Hoplia (Hoplia trivialis) or monkey beetle (above). These smallish, dark beetles are covered in hairs and have a single massive claw on each hind leg (diagnostic for this genus in North America). They overwinter as larvae and pupate early in the spring. Adults emerge and will visit flowers and plants to feed, but are not considered a plant pest.

We have had several samples over the years (two this week) regarding these beetles entering homes. What's even more interesting is that a few of the situations involved them coming in chimneys. Why they do this we're not sure, but just like the mites, these nuisance invaders are harmless, sporadic, and ephemeral. We do not recommend any chemical sprays for these beetles as there is no predictable site of application and homeowners can easily remove the beetles safely from their home using a vacuum or collecting them otherwise to return to the outside.
